CHAS FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

The Ketoctin Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution recently presented the Library with the sixth volume in a series of state resource guides published by the NSDAR Library. This volume, *Maine in the American Revolution: A Source Guide for*

Genealogists and Historians provides detailed information on the availability of manuscript and archival material that exists for the state during the period of the Revolutionary War along with listings of historical and genealogical studies that have been published and which supplement the original sources.

The Library is pleased to announce, through the generosity of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, the recent acquisition of five digital newspaper subscriptions. These papers, *The American Israelite* (1854-2000), *The Atlanta Constitution*

(1868-1984), The Chicago Tribune (1849-1992), The Globe and Mail (1936-2013), and Norfolk Journal and Guide (1916-2013), part of the ProQuest Historical Newspaper Collection, offer full-text and full-image articles. These newspapers are an addition to our existing collection of historical newspapers: The Guardian and The Observer (1791-2003), The Baltimore Sun (1837-1991), The Irish Times and The Weekly Irish Times (1859-2015), and The Scotsman (1817-1950).

We are privileged to be the repository of many outstanding historical collections documenting the history, life, and times of Loudoun County. These resources provide educational and informational opportunities for students, genealogists, businesses, local governments, and citizens. They are also a draw and help to enrich the experience of tourists. Over the last several years the Library has received a number of manuscript collections including The Charles A Johnston Collection, The George R. Head Collection, The Keene/Edwards Family Collection, Ashburn Hotel Collection, R.E. Russell Family Collection, and Mott/Bentley Correspondence. These collections contain papers relating to experiences of individual families in Loudoun County during the 19th and early 20th centuries and document day to day family life in the communities of Aldie, Ashburn, Leesburg, Middleburg, and Sterling. Each of these collections also includes records providing unique documentary history of business in Loudoun County. Once processed, researchers will be able to use these collections to enhance their understanding of how local families operated businesses, practiced trades, sold or acquired needed goods, lived and socialized. In our efforts to make these collections available as quickly as possible we must seek outside funding from organizations and individuals. The largest and most diverse collection donated to the Library, is the Charles A. Johnston Collection (40+ cubic feet). The Library applied for and received two grants, one in 2014 (\$6,300) and another in 2015 (\$8,500). from the Loudoun Library Foundation for processing and making available this rich tapestry of information. We are excited to be able to open this collection to the public. In October Ben Tayloe, project archivist, will host a walking tour of Leesburg highlighting sites featured in the collection and illustrated in an exhibit featured in the Library. In March of 2017, Tayloe will host an opening and lecture to introduce the collection to the community. An intern, Mary Zell Galen from Longwood University, assisted with exhibit and tour preparations. A talented graphic designer, the donor of the collection, is providing marketing images for the tour, exhibit, and lecture. Unprocessed, this collection was full of potential, but inaccessible. Processed, this collection full of everyday items and individual stories offers an unparalleled view of life in Leesburg and Loudoun County from the late 1700s through the 20th century. The Library is grateful for the Loudoun Library Foundation's generous support in helping make this remarkable resource accessible.

For local residents and visitors from across the country and around the globe this library is a destination. Over 33,000 people visited the library in the last fiscal year to conduct research, tour exhibits, attend lectures, and avail themselves of our many outstanding services. To assist visitors a variety of brochures and pathfinders are available in print or online at our website. On-site visitors, have access to an outstanding and helpful staff. For those living far away but with an interest in Leesburg and Loudoun County history, interesting and entertaining historical facts are posted weekly on our Facebook page.

Programs for this upcoming season offer a variety of exciting opportunities. I look forward to welcoming you when visiting the Library or when attending programs and exhibits.

deaths, marriages, and deeds, and




how to use these records in research. No one is permitted to enter restricted areas of the Clerk's Office after 7:00PM, so the group will leave the library promptly at 6:45PM.

THE WILSON DECEPTION David O. Stewart Sunday, 25 September 2016, 2PM



Against the backdrop of the Paris Peace Conference that would remake Europe in the wake of World War I, *The Wilson Deception* reunites Dr. Jamie Fraser and Speed Cook, protagonists of the acclaimed *The Lincoln Deception*, in an intriguing presidential mystery. The Great War has ended and President Woodrow Wilson's arrival in Paris in December 1918 unites the city in celebration. At this pivotal moment in history,

with the Allied victors gathering to forge a peace treaty, the president's health could decide the fate of nations. While Fraser tries to determine the truth about Wilson's maladies, he encounters Speed Cook, a man he has not seen for nearly twenty years. Speed Cook an ex-professional ball player and advocate for Negro rights is desperate to save his son, Joshua, an army sergeant wrongly accused of desertion. Rivalries and hidden agendas abound. At stake is not only Joshua Cook's freedom, but the fragile treaty that may be the only way to stop Europe and the world from plunging into another brutal war. With a cast of vividly drawn characters that includes T.E. Lawrence, David Lloyd George, and Winston Churchill, *The Wilson Deception* provides a riveting and expertly researched blend of history and suspense.

After practicing law for more than 25 years, David O. Stewart turned to writing history (though he still practices law). His first book, *The Summer of 1787: The Men Who Invented the Constitution* was a *Washington Post* best-seller and won the Washington Writing Award as Best Book of 2007. Two years later, *Impeached: The Trial of President Andrew Johnson and the Fight for Lincoln's Legacy*, was a Davis-Kidd Bestseller and was called "the best account of this troubled episode" by Professor David Donald of Harvard. Stewart also is president of the *Washington Independent Review of Books*, an online book review. Books will be available for purchase.

James Roberts, a native of Leesburg, member of Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission, 2008 recipient of a Loudoun History Award, and recognized in 2011 by Loudoun Laurels, will lead a walking tour of Leesburg. The tour is an insider's commentary of local



EMBASSY TO THE EASTERN COURTS Andrew C. A. Jampoler Sunday, 2 October 2016, 2PM


In the aftermath of the Napoleonic Wars, the US found its merchants and traders locked out of their traditional markets in Europe and the Caribbean. Hoping for new and profitable American trade relationships, President Andrew Jackson dispatched an unemployed ship-owner and merchant with no diplomatic experience on a secret mission to negotiate with Eastern potentates. Edmund Roberts' mission was to formalize American trade with these exotic places –



Oman, Siam, Cochin China, and Japan – on a most favored nation basis, allowing for American consuls to openly advance and protect American interests and citizens in their host countries. After sailing almost 70,000 miles in five years on the ill-fated *USS Peacock*, Roberts was successful in negotiating treaties with Oman and Siam, but he failed in Cochin China, and he died before setting sail to Japan. The *USS Peacock*, first flagship of the Navy's new East Indies Squadron, forerunner of the US Seventh Fleet, outlived Roberts by only a few years.

Andrew C. A. Jampoler, a former commanding officer of Patrol Squadron 19 and of Naval Air Station Moffett Field in California, spent twenty-four years as a naval aviator before his retirement from the US Navy in 1986. The author of numerous books and articles, Jampoler won the Naval Institute Press's Author of the Year in 2003 for *Adak* and *Naval History* magazine's Author of the Year in 2006. A CONFEDERATE BIOGRAPHY: THE CRUISE OF THE CSS SHENANDOAH Dwight Sturtevant Hughes Sunday, 16 October 2016, 2PM



From October 1864 to November 1865, the CSS Shenandoah carried the Civil War around the alobe to the ends of the earth through every extreme of sea and storm. Her officers represented a cross section of the Confederacy from Old Dominion first families through the Deep South aristocracy to a middleclass Missourian: a nephew of Robert E. Lee: a grandnephew of George Mason; a son-in-

law to Raphael Semmes; grandsons of men who fought at George Washington's side; an uncle of Theodore Roosevelt. They considered themselves Americans, Southerners, rebels, and warriors embarking on the voyage of their lives, defending their country as they understood it, and pursuing a difficult, dangerous mission in which they succeeded spectacularly after it no longer mattered. The *CSS Shenandoah* contributed to the diplomatic maelstrom of the Civil War and fired the last gun of the conflict. Seven months after Lee's surrender, the *CSS Shenandoah* limped into Liverpool. Captain Waddell lowered the last Confederate banner without defeat or surrender. This is, as Admiral Semmes describes, a biography of a cruise and a microcosm of the Confederate-American Experience.

Dwight Hughes graduated from the US Naval Academy and served twenty years as a Navy surface warfare officer on many oceans in ships ranging from destroyer to aircraft carrier and with river forces in Vietnam (Bronze Star for Meritorious Service, Purple Heart). Building on a lifetime of study in naval history, he lives and writes in Nokesville, Virginia. Books will be available for purchase.



SYREN'S SONG: A CONNOR STARK NOVEL

Syren's Song is the second novel featuring Connor Stark. This geopolitical thriller begins when the Sri Lankan navy is unexpectedly attacked by a resurgent and separatist Tamil Tiger organization. The government issues a letter of marque to former US Navy officer Connor Stark, now the head of the private security company, Highland Maritime Defense. Stark and his eclectic compatriots accept the challenge only to learn that the


Sea Tigers, who crippled the Sri Lankan navy, are no ordinary terrorists. With new allies and new enemies, Stark and company face terrorism, war, conspiracy, and murder.

Claude Berube has taught at the US Naval Academy, worked at the Office of Naval Intelligence and the US Senate, and as an officer in the Navy Reserve deployed overseas. He has been a fellow with both the Brookings Institution and Heritage Foundation, and is the author of three non-fiction books and *The Aden Effect*, the first book in the Conner Stark series. PRACTISE TO DECEIVE: LEARNING CURVES OF MILITARY DECEPTION PLANNERS BY BARTON WHALEY A. Denis Clift

Written by the undisputed dean of US denial and deception experts, *Practise to Deceive* is the most indepth look at deception as a military strategy. Barton Whaley knew the history of denial and deception across time, disciplines, and culture. He was the foremost authority on the intricacies of denial and deception strategy and tactics. For Whaley, deception was a mind-game, requiring imagination, deep critical thought, a profound understanding of the




enemy as well as one's self (a variation of Sun Tzu), and patience and fortitude. This book presents 88 vividly descriptive case studies to serve as a handbook for intelligence and military professionals. In Whaley's analysis, variations in guilefulness between opposing individuals or groups can be crucial in deciding who achieves victory in combat.

Barton Whaley, who passed away in 2013, received his BA in Chinese studies from the University of California, Berkeley before serving with the intelligence section of US Army Psychological Warfare headquartered in Tokyo during the Korean War. Following the war, he attended London University School of Oriental and African Studies before

receiving his PhD at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. A. Denis Clift, a graduate of Stanford University and the London School of Economics and Political Science, is Vice President for Planning and Operations of the United States Naval Institute. Clift is a former naval officer, President Emeritus of the National Defense Intelligence College and has served in military and civilian capacities in the administrations of 11 successive presidents. He is the author of several books, both fiction and non-fiction, and is co-author of *The Oxford Handbook of National Security Intelligence*. Books will be available for purchase.



LION IN THE BAY: THE BRITISH INVASION OF THE CHESAPEAKE, 1813-14 Sunday, 4 December 2016, 2PM Chipp Reid, editor

The story of Fort McHenry's defense during the War of 1812 is well known, but *Lion in the Bay* by Stanley L. Quick with Chipp Reid takes an intimate and thorough look at the events preceding the battle that inspired our national anthem. Despite a massive bombardment at Fort McHenry, Baltimore's defenses held, forcing the British to abandon their campaign to close the Chesapeake. *Lion in the Bay*



retells this story of American resilience and triumph in the wake of catastrophe with amazing detail and great skill.

The late Stanley Quick, who died in 2008, served on active duty in the US Navy from 1944–47 before working for many years as a naval architect and civilian engineer. He received his PhD from Brooklyn Polytechnic in 1963 and began a long career with Westinghouse Electric Corporation. Chipp Reid is an award-winning reporter and editor, a licensed ship captain, historian, and Cold War veteran. He has covered wars in Iraq and Afghanistan as well as baseball, international soccer, and international piracy. His book Intrepid Sailors: The Legacy of Preble's Boys and the Tripoli Campaign was named a "Notable Naval Book of 2012" by Proceedings magazine. Books will be available for purchase.

RESEARCHING AFRICAN AMERICAN GENEALOGY

Thursday, 2 February 2017, 10AM

Cara Griggs will discuss methods and resources for African American genealogy prior to the end of the Civil War. Attendees will learn about ways of determining whether an individual was enslaved or free and what types of records will be useful for further research. The lecture will focus on the Library of Virginia's collections including cohabitation registers, free Negro registers and lists, wills, deeds, and tax records as well as selected federal records that can be accessed through its databases. Griggs has been a reference archivist at the Library of Virginia since 2006. She earned a BA in history from Westhampton College of the University of Richmond, an MA in social sciences from the University of Chicago, and an MSLIS with an archival studies concentration from Drexel University. She is a member of the Academy of Certified Archivists.

INFORMATION SEEKING STRATEGIES IN THE DIGITAL AGE

Thursday, 2 March 2017, 10AM

Under the direction of **Laura E. Christiansen**, Curator of Manuscripts and Archives, participants will learn techniques for developing and implementing effective search techniques. While the techniques discussed are applicable in a wide variety of environments, specific attention will be paid to digital resources, including Thomas Balch Library's new sound and moving image kiosk. Participants will leave the workshop with new skills for smarter, faster, and more wide-reaching searches.

RESEARCHING COURT RECORDS

Jeanette Irby, Loudoun County Circuit Court Judge and former Leesburg Town Attorney will discuss how to use court records and other resources for data that are frequently overlooked in genealogical and historical research. Examples of these records include real estate records, chancery suits, estates, and indexes. Irby currently serves as secretary of District VI of the Virginia DAR Chapters. She holds a BS from Central Michigan University and a JD from Thomas Cooley Law School.
