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Pews FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

Since the last issue of the Balch Column many changes have taken place. It would seem we are living in a new world for which the symphony has not yet been written. The impact of the Covid-19 pandemic has been felt by staff, volunteers, and patrons alike with the cancellation of events and the transfer of others to virtual platforms; temporary closure of the library and now research and visiting exhibits by appointment only. We were closed to the public from March 16-June 3. Since June 3 we have been providing access for research and to view exhibits by appointment on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Classes, albeit on a virtual platform, resumed in August.

Registration is mandatory for our classes scheduled through at least December – without registration you will not have access to the necessary links to participate in the class.

All our procedures for accessing the library, including registration and virtual reference may be found on our website. Staff has created a short video, "Wallace the Bear Researches at Thomas Balch Library," currently featured on Facebook and soon to be posted to the website, to assist you in understanding the process for scheduling an appointment.

Since our closure, two staff members accepted full time employment. Tahari Van Johnson accepted a position with the Massachusetts Trial Court Library system and Kelly Arford-Horne accepted a position as an archeologist with the Germanna Foundation in Virginia. While Tahari has moved out of the area and will no longer be with us, Kelly, we are pleased to say, will be staying on with the Library, though only with occasional hours. It is also my pleasure to note that a former employee, Stephanie Seal Walters, now working at the University of Southern Mississippi, defended her dissertation in August and is a newly minted PhD in History.

COLLECTION PROCESSING

Following the departure of Stephanie Seal Walters, Maria Christina Mairena is now completing processing of the Elaine Thompson Collection. The donation to Thomas Balch Library of educator and historian Elaine E. Thompson's (1932 – 2016) personal and research papers has vielded three discrete collections. The first collection, The Loudoun County Emancipation Association (LCEA) Collection, 1896 to 2015 (M0145) contains records of the association, with the bulk of the material covering from 1896 to 1971. The records comprise minutes, speeches, membership lists, biographical, genealogical, and census information about LCEA members, newspaper articles. and financial reports. The LCEA documents also include research for Elaine Thompson's book, In the Watchfires, The Loudoun County Emancipation Association. 1890-1971. The second collection. Death and Remembrance Materials. Loudoun County, VA and Vicinity, 1900–2015 (M0146) contains obituaries, funeral programs, photos (living and dead), and memorial service programs, primarily of African-American residents of Loudoun County. The third collection, which is currently being processed, is the Elaine E. Thompson Papers. The Papers are the largest collection of the three, containing research and notes on Loudoun County Colored Schools and Douglass High School; local and regional Black history including local historically Black

churches; research for a variety of history articles, speeches, and exhibits; along with family photos, letters, and genealogical research on the Thompson family. These three collections are outstanding additions to the Rust Archive. They add to our knowledge of Loudoun County African—American history: their fraternal organizations, celebrations, hard work done to provide higher education, and familial information, which will be of use to genealogical researchers and historians.

ALEXANDRA S. GRESSITT

is nearing completion of processing the Mott-Bentley Correspondence 1835-1900 and n.d. (bulk 1835-1865). The Correspondence, digitized by a graduate student, Shannon Combs-Bennet, has now been sorted and foldered with many letters sleeved. This collection contains approximately 505 letters and related materials detailing Leesburg and Loudoun County Virginia life, customs, education, families, and experiences primarily before and during the American Civil War. The collection demonstrates the fluidity of society during formative years of the United States with correspondence ranging from South Carolina. Pennsylvania, New York, and westward to Kentucky, and documenting duels, education, commentary on enslaved peoples, and the home front during war time. The collection provides greater insight into the lives of women in the nineteenth century than of Mott's medical practice, but compliments Mott materials in the Ethel Littlejohn Adams Collection (M091).

VOLUNTEER FROM HOME OPPORTUNITY

Thomas Balch Library is launching new online opportunities to volunteer! Over the summer, volunteers helped to test and improve a pilot online transcription website set-up. Jeanette Irby, Loudoun County Circuit Court Judge and former Leesburg Town Attorney will discuss how to use court records and other resources for data that are frequently overlooked in genealogical and historical research. Irby will demonstrate how to mine court records for clues that can be used to collect information for genealogical research. Examples of these records include real estate records, chancery suits, estates, and indexes. Jeanette Irby has researched land records dating from the 1700s and participated in genealogical seminars sponsored by the Warrenton Court House Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution of which she is past Regent. Irby currently serves as secretary of District VI of the Virginia DAR Chapters. She holds a BS from Central Michigan University and a JD from Thomas Cooley Law School in Lansing, MI.

Thursday, 5 August 2021, 10AM


