The Library is celebrating its centenary! On 6 May 2022, the Town of Leesburg hosted a celebration for the Library in recognition of its 100 years of operation. A Proclamation was read by Mayor Kelly Burk at the ceremony and representatives

of the Town, Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission, Black History Committee, and Thomas Balch Library Endowment Foundation presented remarks on the history and future

of the Library. The ceremony



included the dedication of a Lavender Twist Weeping Redbud planted on the grounds of the Library. To mark the centennial the Library has published a booklet, funded by the Thomas Balch Library Endowment Foundation, entitled *The Town of Leesburg Celebrates Thomas Balch Library 100 Years 1922-2022 A Century of Knowledge.* This illustrated booklet documents the Library's rich heritage as seen through eyes of longtime supporters and library users. Complimentary copies are available from the Library as well as commemorative bookmarks and wallet magnifiers. During the month of May the Library presented an exhibit on the life and times of Thomas Balch Library. This exhibit will be

reprised and shown at Loudoun Museum during March and April 2023 and during May of 2023 the Library will present an exhibit "Highlights of 100 Years of Collecting at Thomas Balch Library" in the Margaret Mercer Room of the Library.

This year's Loudoun History Award ceremony will be held Sunday, 6 November 2022. The Thomas Balch Library Advisory commissioners will recognize both the 2021 and 2022 Loudoun History Award recipients.




Friends of the Thomas Balch Library Annual Event Sunday, 11 September 2022, 4-7PM

## THE INDENTURE OF IVY O'NEILL Diane Helentjaris





Stuck researching the women in your family tree? Would you like to know more about the lives of women in the past? Or other marginalized folks? Helentjaris will share innovative tips and tools from her experience as a writer. Learn how the lives of an Irish girl in the 1690s and a Wild West broncho-riding woman in 1913 are brought to life. Copies of her historical novel The Indenture of Ivy O'Neill will be available for purchase.

Diane Helentjaris is the author of the new historical fiction book set in late 1600s Ireland and Colo-

nial Maryland, *The Indenture of Ivy O'Neill*. The novel offers the fact-inspired story of a young girl, kidnapped, transported to

America, and sold into servitude. It has been nominated for the National Library Association's Alex Award. Helentjaris, a 2020 Iceland Writers' Retreat Alumni Award finalist, often writes for local magazines. Her writing is featured in the international anthology Strife & Harmony and in Glimpses of Our World, a Bilingual Anthology of Greek American Poetry. Her poetry chapbook Diaspora is centered



on the impact of immigration. She received her BA cum laude in Interdisciplinary Humanities, her MD from Michigan State University, and her Master's in Public Health from the University of Michigan. She worked as a clinical physician and public health administrator before returning to her humanities roots. As a physician, she was elected national president of the American Medical Women's Association and for many years did advocacy work for women's health on their behalf at the national level.

## CLERK'S OFFICE TOUR, LOUDOUN COUNTY COURTHOUSE HISTORIC RECORDS


Eric S. Larson Tuesday, 4 October 2022, 3-5PM

#### LOUDOUN HISTORY AWARDS Sunday, 6 November 2022, 2-4PM



## A YEAR OF FRIGHTFUL CALAMITIES: DISASTERS AND RECONSTRUCTION IN RICHMOND, 1870

#### Alyssa Fahringer Sunday, 23 October 2022, 2-4PM

In 1870, Richmond, former capital of the Confederacy, endured three disasters. On 27 April, over sixty people died when the Capitol courtroom gallery and floor collapsed; the James River flooded on 30 September, resulting in thousands of dollars of damage; and eight people perished when Spotswood Hotel caught fire 25 December. This presentation will discuss how Richmonders experienced, responded to, and remembered the 1870 calamities, as well as how the disasters affected a community in a time of extreme political and racial upheaval. The five years following the end of the Civil War represented a time of hope for many Black Richmonders, while some white Richmonders viewed Radical Reconstruction as a threat to white supremacy. Richmonders' responses to the disasters were shaped by the political and racial contexts in which they occurred: despite significant tensions between white and Black Richmonders, journalists perpetuated a false narrative of racial harmony between the two communities; after the flood decimated the primarily Black neighborhood of Rocketts, few reporters detailed their suffering; and the Spotswood Hotel fire victims received less laudatory press



coverage because they were poorer and less socially prominent than the Capitol disaster dead. Northerners provided aid to their former enemies in the wake of the Capitol disaster, prefiguring eventual reconciliation between the North and South. Lost Cause adherents later co-opted the Capitol disaster and argued that it exemplified the failure of Reconstruction.

Alyssa Toby Fahringer has a PhD in American history with minor fields in digital humanities and public history from George Mason University. She holds a faculty appointment as the Digital Scholarship Consultant at George Mason University Libraries' Digital Scholarship Center. In this role Alyssa collaborates with students and faculty on digital humanities-based methods and projects. She teaches classroom instruction sessions, leads workshops, and provides consultations to researchers who are engaging in digital scholarship. Alyssa is affiliated with the Center for Mason Legacies, an interdisciplinary and collaborative research center established by the University Libraries and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences whose mission is to preserve and examine the legacy of George Mason IV (1725-1792), his ancestors and heirs, and the people he enslaved.

Dark Queen of Donegal, historical fiction, tells the compelling story of Ineen Dubh, Celtic warrior queen, and her son Red Hugh, legendary prince of Donegal. It captures the spirit of sixteenth century England as Elizabeth sought to assert her power over Ireland and Scotland.

Mary Pat Ferron Canes heard tales of Donegal, Ireland, while in kindergarten from her grandmother, and became intrigued by her Irish heritage. She holds a graduate degree in anthropology from George Washington University where she focused her research on Irish heritage and Gaelic men and women and an undergraduate degree from St. Catherine University. While an adjunct faculty member at Rochester Institute of Technology, Cane continued researching and writing on Irish history. She has written a series of booklets, poems, and articles which have appeared in numerous

journals and is a member of the National League of American Pen Women. Raised in the Midwest, she has lived most of her life in Virginia. *Dark Queen of Donegal* will be available for purchase at the event.

#### NEWS ABOUT COLLECTIONS AND EXHIBITS Exhibit featuring Elaine E. Thompson, educator and Loudoun County Historian will be on display September 2022

Thomas Balch Library acquired the papers of Elaine Eppie Thompson, noted Loudoun County historian and educator, shortly after she passed away on October 9, 2016. In February 2022, Loudoun County School Board members voted unanimously to name a new elementary school in her honor. To celebrate the dedication and start of the first full new school year at Elaine E. Thompson Elementary School, Thomas Balch Library will present an exhibit in September to honor Thompson and culminate the processing of three important collections related to her life and work. Thompson, a native of Purcellville, was a leading chronicler of Loudoun's African American community. With the Black History Committee of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, Thompson published *In the Watchfires: The Loudoun County Emancipation Association, 1890-1971*, documenting the history of the Loudoun County Emancipation Association. She procured a Virginia historical highway marker for the Emancipation Grounds in Purcellville, Virginia, won multiple local NAACP awards, and was recognized by the Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission with a Loudoun History Award in 1998.

The exhibit will highlight materials from three new collections donated by Thompson and her family:

- Elaine E. Thompson Collection (M0134)
- · Loudoun County Emancipation Association, 1896 2015 (M0145)
- Thompson Funeral Program and Memorial Collection 1900-2015, (M0146) Processing of these materials was made possible through grant funds from The Clarence L. Robey Charitable Trust, The Mildred T. Nichols Trust, and the Loudoun Library Foundation. Thompson made it her life goal to see the history of African Americans in Northern Virginia recognized and documented. Now available to researchers, these extensive collections not only document Thompson's career and contributions to African American and local history, but also provide valuable materials for future researchers for generations to come.

What new digital tools are available to help access and understand historic documents and data? **Stephanie Seal Walters, PhD,** former Senior Library Associate at Thomas Balch Library, will introduce the digital side of historical research and explore different digital humanities' methodologies that are accessible and friendly to all users. Dr. Walters taught digital humanities courses at both George Mason University and the University of Southern Mississippi. ### RESEARCHING COURT RECORDS

Irby will demonstrate how to mine court records for clues that can be used to collect information for genealogical research. Examples of these records include real estate records, chancery suits, estates, and indexes. Jeanette Irby has researched land records dating from the 1700s and participated in genealogical seminars sponsored by the Warrenton Court House Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution of which she is past Regent. Irby currently serves as secretary of District VI of the Virginia DAR Chapters. She holds a BS from

Central Michigan University and a JD from Thomas Cooley Law School in Lansing, MI.


