This year's Loudoun History Award ceremony was held the first Sunday of November. The ceremony celebrated both the 2021 and 2022 awardees. For 2021, Michael R. Napper and The Family and Friends of the Mount Sinai Cemetery, Claudette Bard, Ron Campbell, Edward W. Spannaus, and Howard Gilbert Timbers, Jr., were recognized. The Black History

Committee of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, having previously received a Loudoun History Award

(2016) received special recognition for their commemorative efforts in connection with Frederick Douglass Elementary School. For 2022, Susan Pemberton Webber was recognized for her many contributions to the advocacy and furtherance of history through participation in and support of Thomas Balch Library, Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, Black History



Committee of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, and membership in heritage organizations. Charles A. Johnston was recognized for his many contributions to educational outreach and the preservation and documentation of Leesburg and Loudoun County history.



This year we lost two long serving committed members of our Library community, Pauline Singletary (1930-2022) and Martha A. Schonberger (1961-2022). Pauline S. Singletary was the first Chair of the Black History Committee of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, serving in that capacity from 2000-2008 and was a recipient of a Loudoun History Award in 2005. Martha Schonberger served as a Commissioner on the Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission for 14 years, from 2002-2010 and again from 2017-2022. During those years she was Chair from 2004-07 and Vice Chair 2008 and again from 2019-2022. It was a privilege to have known and worked with them. They will be missed but their legacy lives on.

New staff at TBL since my last letter include Anna Carneal, Genealogy Associate and Madison (Maddie) Russell, Cataloger. Additionally, Michelle Champ, Sara Donovan, and Taylor Ruzinsky have joined the Library as part time reference staff. Helen Fonda Vettori joined us in January as a Library Assistant.

The Loudoun Library Foundation has generously awarded the Library a grant of \$4,900 to assist in processing the collection of the late Charles L. Waddell (1932-2022), who represented Loudoun and parts of Fairfax County in the Virginia State Senate for 26 years.



The Library continues to celebrate its centenary! Complimentary copies of *Thomas Balch Library* 100 Years 1922-2022, an illustrated booklet documenting the Library's rich heritage as seen through eyes of longtime supporters and library users, are available from the Library as well as commemorative bookmarks and wallet magnifiers. As a capstone to all the celebrations, during the month of May, the Library will be presenting an exhibit: Highlights of 100 Years of Collecting at Thomas Balch Library in the Margaret Mercer Room of the Library.

The Library is committed to providing open access to all its resources and is in the process of establishing its own catalog, separate from Loudoun County Public Library, converting from Dewey to Library of Congress classification system. This will enable us to provide a single point of access to all our holdings no matter the format. In the coming months we will be sharing our progress and providing training opportunities to understand our new catalog.

AFRICAN AMERICANS AND NATIVE AMERICANS IN THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

Sunday, 12 February 2023, 2PM Charles Jameson




As of today, it is known that over 8,000 African Americans and Native Americans fought in the American Revolution. Some were free and some enslaved. Whether fighting for the British cause or for the American cause, African Americans and Native Americans were fighting for their Freedom. This talk is based on information extracted from the Daughters of the American Revolution's research on Forgotten Patriots and from other Revolutionary War resources.

Charles Jameson, born in Culpeper VA, was educated in a segregated school system, graduating from George Washington Carver Regional High School in 1965 and from Virginia Commonwealth University in 1970 with a BS in Education. He served in Vietnam for 13 months, 1970-1971, with three units, including the 11th armored Cavalry first of the 5th Mechanized units on the DMZ, and finishing with the 101st Airborne on the Laotian Border. While deployed in Vietnam he earned the Purple Heart, three bronze Stars and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry - a unit citation. Following military service, he entered civilian life pursuing a career as Project Superintendent heavy highway and site development in Maryland and Virginia. Upon retirement, he joined Sons of the American Revolution which has been an enlightening and informative experience as he has learned a lot about his own lineage back to the Revolutionary War and the Culpeper Minutemen. Jameson served as President of the Culpeper Minute Men Chapter Virginia Society of Sons of the American Revolution (VASSAR) from 2020-2022 during which time the chapter was recognized as top a national medium sized chapter. Other honors include being named a Culpeper Colonel by Culpeper Board of Supervisors in 2017, receiving the 2022 NAACP Culpeper Branch 7058, Community Service and Activism Award, and winning the "Aging Together 5 Over 50" Culpeper County Award. He serves on the board of Culpeper History Museum, Carver 4 County Museum, George Washington Carver Agricultural Research Center and is Historian for the Culpeper Minutemen Chapter VASSAR.



MASTERING THE ART OF COMMAND: ADMIRAL CHESTER W. NIMITZ AND THE VICTORY IN THE PACIFIC Sunday, 5 March 2023, 2PM Trent Hone



Mastering the Art of Command is an examination of Admiral Chester W. Nimitz's leadership during World War II. It describes how he used his talents to guide the Pacific Fleet following attacks on Pearl Harbor to win crucial victories against the Imperial Japan forces and seize the initiative in the Pacific. Once Nimitz's forces held the initiative, they maintained it through an offensive campaign of unparalleled speed overcoming Japanese defenses and creating conditions for victory. Mastering the Art of Command

explores how Nimitz used his leadership skills, command talents, and strategic acumen to achieve decisive results. Nimitz's "strategic artistry" is a pattern worthy of study and emulation, for today's military officers, civilian leaders, and managers in large organizations.

Trent Hone is an award-winning naval historian and Vice President of Solution Architecture with ICF International, based in Fairfax, Virginia. He is the author of Learning War: The Evolution of Fighting Doctrine in the U.S. Navy, 1898–1945, which explores how the US Navy developed learning mechanisms before World War II that accelerated victory during the conflict. His article, "U.S. Navy Surface Battle Doctrine and Victory in the Pacific" was awarded the US Naval War College's Edward S. Miller Prize and the Naval History and Heritage Command's Ernest M. Eller Prize. His essay, "Guadalcanal Proved Experimentation Works" earned second place in the 2017 Chief of Naval Operations Naval History Essay Contest.

CIVIL WAR WALKING TOUR OF LEESBURG Richard Treat Gillespie Saturday, 25 March 2023, 10AM




With its key geographic location just two miles from the Potomac Frontier that divided the Confederate and United States, Leesburg was bound to see a good deal of the Civil War. A Walking Tour of Civil War Leesburg with Rich Gillespie will examine the surviving Civil War townscape and watch the War develop and engulf the county seat of Loudoun. In a circuit of the historic district, the emphasis will be on what the 1,500 residents of the town would have seen at various places and what they would have

experienced during 1861-65. The two-hour chronological tour will provide ample spots to sit for the weary and will paint vibrant historic portraits to keep people enthralled. Included in the tour will be three skirmish sites, outside stops at two churches, the courthouse lawn, "the best street in town," Harrison Hall where General Lee stayed, and the Episcopal cemetery.

Richard Treat Gillespie, former Executive Director for Northern Virginia's Mosby Heritage Area (now known as Virginia Piedmont Heritage Area Association), is a founding member of Loudoun's Civil War Sesquicentennial Steering Committee. Before joining the Mosby Heritage Area Association in 2004, he taught US History and Economics for 30 years at Loudoun Valley High School in Purcellville, VA. A graduate of the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, he is a strong believer in melding the classroom, the community, and historic sites through heritage education. The tour leaves from Thomas Balch Library parking lot at 10AM. Note: This tour requires good walking shoes.

REAGAN'S WAR STORIES Sunday, 2 April 2023, 2PM Benjamin Griffin



Reagan's War Stories examines the relationship between Ronald Reagan, the public, and popular culture. From an overview of Reagan's youth and the pulp fiction he consumed, we get a sense of the future president's good/evil outlook. Carrying that over into Reagan's reading and choices as president, Griffin situates narrative at the center of Reagan's political formation and leadership providing a compelling account of both Reagan's life, his presidency, and a lens into non-traditional strategy formulation. Reagan treated fictional portrayals

seriously, believing they shaped public views and offered valid ways to think through geo-political issues. Showing how Reagan used narrative as both a consumer and a communicator, Griffin notes Reagan identified with certain stories and how they shaped him as a political leader influencing his approach to complex issues. When handled deftly, incorporating fiction created a common language across the administration and provided a way to convey messages to the masses in a memorable fashion.

Benjamin Griffin is a US Army officer who earned his PhD in history from the University of Texas. He teaches in the Department of History at the United States Military Academy and resides at West Point with his family.


LEESBURG TOUR James P. Roberts Saturday, 6 May 2023, 9-12PM



James Roberts, a native of Leesburg, former member of Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission, 2008 recipient of a Loudoun History Award, and recognized in 2011 by Loudoun Laurels, will lead a walking tour of Leesburg. The tour is an insider's commentary of local people, places, and points of interest both in and around Leesburg. Particular detail is paid to how Leesburg has grown and evolved

through the years architecturally, economically, and racially. Factual, historical, and anecdotal information is intertwined and presented in storytelling fashion as only someone who lived through it and thoughtfully observed it, can do. BLOW UP Sunday, 7 May 2023, 2PM Ellen Crosby



In Blow Up the third Sophie Medina mystery (following Multiple Exposure in 2015 and Ghost Image in 2016) international photojournalist Sophie Medina and her old school friend Father Jack O'Hara are out for a run on Capitol Hill when they find the body of Associate Supreme Court Justice Everett Townsend lying in an alley, barely alive. When Townsend dies in the ER, his death has repercussions for Sophie after her friend, Javi Aguilera, is murdered. This murder and a dark secret with potential of having a devasting impact

on the nation's highest court heighten the sense of urgency as Sophie searches looking for evidence before everything blows up in her face.

Ellen Crosby is the author of 16 books: 3 mysteries featuring photojournalist Sophie Medina, 12 in the Virginia wine country mystery series, and Moscow Nights, a standalone. Her books have been nominated for the Mary Higgins Clark Award and the Library of Virginia People's Choice Award; The Riesling Retribution won the 2009 Gourmand World Cookbook Award for Best US Wine Literature Book. Previously she worked as a freelance reporter for The Washington Post, Moscow correspondent for ABC Radio News, and as an economist at the US Senate. After living overseas for many years, Crosby, who has an undergraduate degree in political science from Catholic University and a master's in international affairs from The Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies, now lives in the DC suburbs of northern Virginia with her husband.


CLERK'S OFFICE TOUR, **LOUDOUN COUNTY** COURTHOUSE HISTORIC **RECORDS**

Meet in the parking lot of Thomas Balch Library by 1:45PM. Eric S. Larson, Historic Records Manager for the Clerk of the Circuit Court, will lead a tour of the Clerk's Office and the Historic Court Building. He will discuss the extent of Loudoun County's records holdings, where to look for records of births, deaths, marriages, and deeds, and how to use these records in research. THE BURNING LAND! David O. Stewart Sunday, 21 May 2023, 2PM



The Burning Land! is book two in Stewart's fictional Overstreet Saga which takes the reader back in time to tell uniquely American stories—full of adventure, excitement, heartbreak, and a tapestry of richly developed characters. This book follows the love of Henry Overstreet of the Twentieth Maine Regiment through Fredericksburg. Gettysburg, and the

battles of 1864 and of Katie Nash of Maine whom Overstreet's marries on the Fourth of July 1864 while on a two week leave. Their lives are upended by the tragedies of the American Civil War and then of their westward migration to Chicago, both inflict excruciating trials and loss.

After many years as a trial and appellate lawyer, David O. Stewart became a bestselling writer of history and historical fiction. His first novel, The Lincoln Deception, about the John Wilkes Booth conspiracy, was called the best historical novel of 2013 by Bloomberg View. Sequels include The Paris Deception, set at the Paris Peace Conference in 1919, and The Babe Ruth Deception, which follows Babe's first two years with the Yankees. Stewart's histories explore the writing of the Constitution, the gifts of James Madison, the western expedition and treason trial of Aaron Burr, and the impeachment of President Andrew Johnson. In February 2021, Dutton published Stewart's George Washington: The Political Rise of America's Founding Father.

News about Collections & Exhibits

LORD LOUDOUN



At the Friends of Thomas Balch Library 100th Anniversary event on 9 September 2022, Brown and Margaret Morton presented the library with the gift of an engraving of John Campbell, 4th Earl of Loudoun (1705-1782). Son of Hugh Campbell, Third Earl of Loudoun (1684-1731) and Lady Margaret Dalrymple (1677-1777), John Campbell gained peerage as Earl of Loudoun upon his father's death in 1731. Entering military service, Campbell raised a regiment of highlanders to fight against the Jacobite Rebellion in 1745, winning the favor of King George II. In 1756, Campbell was appointed captain-general and governor-in-chief of the province of Virginia, and shortly after, became command-

er-in-chief of the British troops in America. Although he was unpopular among many of the American colonists and never set foot in Virginia, Loudoun County was named in his honor in 1757.

The mezzotint engraving donated by the Mortons presents Campbell as "Captn. General, & Governour in Chief, of his Majesty's Forces, in North America; and One of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland" and was created by Charles Spooner (1720-1767) after a 1747 portrait by Allan Ramsay (1713-1784). The engraving will be on view at the library beginning in Spring 2023.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL ARTIFACTS FROM SYCOLIN POTTERY A SPECIAL EVENT

In July 2021, Thomas Balch Library received a collection of between 350-500 ceramic fragments collected at the Sycolin Pottery site located just outside of Leesburg. Discovered in 2004, the Sycolin site at one time hosted two kilns used in the production of redware and stoneware ceramic vessels by potters from the Gardner and Duncan families of Loudoun County. Following acquisition of these materials, library staff consulted with Loudoun County Archaeologist Steve Thompson and with Kelly Arford-Horne, Research Archaeologist at The Germanna Foundation, concerning best practices for the long-term preservation of these fragments. Both archeologists recommended creating a photographic catalog of the collection for research use to enable ease of access and to preserve the original fragments. Once created and made available to researchers, the catalog will also enable the library to offer programing centered on preservation of archaeological remains in Loudoun and to expand our growing collection of resources related to decorative arts and craftsmen in 18th and 19th century Loudoun. In 2021, Loudoun Library Foundation grant funding was received to support cataloging the collection. You can help too! Join us in Thomas Balch Library's meeting room on **Saturday**, **4 March at 11AM** to learn about documenting artifacts from archaeological excavations and try your hand at cataloging a unique piece of Loudoun County's history.

AFRICAN AMERICAN GENEALOGY Thursday, 2 February 2023, 10AM

Lori Kimball, a member of the Black History Committee of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, co-researcher of the Enslaved Community of President James Monroe, and researcher of the enslaved community at Oatlands, will discuss resources available at Thomas Balch Library and the Loudoun County Courthouse and use of online resources. Steve Hammond, a 7th generation member of the Syphax family of Washington, DC: a line moved by force to New Orleans and then by choice to Denver, will share his efforts to make the field more relatable and relevant to the public at large, particularly as interest in and access to DNA/ancestry/genealogy data becomes more available.

Irby currently serves as secretary of District VI of the Virginia DAR Chapters. She holds a BS from Central Michigan University and a JD from Thomas Cooley Law School in Lansing, MI.

Shannon Combs-Bennett (QG, MSc, PLCGS) is an award-winning author and genealogical researcher based in Northern Virginia. She lectures and writes on various topics, from genealogical methodology to genetic genealogy. Shannon holds a BS in Biology with an emphasis in genetics and an MSc in Genealogical, Heraldic, and Paleographic Studies. She also earned her Professional Learning Certificate in Genealogical Studies from the National Institute for Genealogcal Studies. 
