



WALKING TOURS WITH LOCAL HISTORIANS:

Leesburg Tour
James P. Roberts
Saturday, 12 October 2024, 9AM-12PM

James Roberts, a native of Leesburg, former member of Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission, 2008 recipient of a Loudoun History Award, and recognized in 2011 by Loudoun Laurels, will lead a walking tour of Leesburg. The tour is an insider's commentary



of local people, places, and points of interest both in and around Leesburg. Particular detail is paid to how Leesburg has grown and evolved through the years architecturally, economically, and racially. Factual, historical, and anecdotal information is intertwined and presented in storytelling fashion as only someone who lived through it and thoughtfully observed it, can do. This unique tour will leave from Thomas Balch Library parking lot at 9AM. *Note: This tour requires good walking shoes.*

Clerk's Office Tour, Loudoun County Courthouse Historic

Meet in the parking lot of Thomas Balch Library by 1:45PM. Eric S. Larson, Historic Records Manager for the Clerk of the Circuit Court, will lead a tour of the Clerk's Office and the Historic Court Building. He will discuss the extent of Loudoun County's records holdings, where to look for records of births, deaths, marriages, and deeds, and how to use these records in research. You will need to pass through security so the group will leave the library promptly at 1:45PM.

Leesburg, Loudoun County and the American Revolution Richard T. Gillespie Saturday, 2 November 2024, 10AM-12PM

Leesburg. Loudoun. and the American Revolution, a leisurely two-hour history exploration of Leesburg and Loudoun's past, led by local historian Rich Gillespie, will begin at Thomas Balch Library at 10AM. A long-time history teacher in Gillespie the county, Historian Emeritus for the Virginia Piedmont Heritage Area. In the decade that brought on the American Revolution—the 1770s— Loudoun was a new county, created by the House of Burgesses in 1757, and was what modern historians refer to as the "Southern Back Country." West of the "fall line" European settlers arrived here as much from Pennsylvania as from long-settled Tidewater Virginia. This tour will both introduce you to the American Revolution and how it played locally against the backdrop of the historic landscape that remains from that time. Registration is required. Good Walking shoes, warm clothes, and a bottle of water are recommended as you will be outside for the morning. The tour leaves from Thomas Balch Library parking lot at 10AM. (Tour limited to: 50)

A Revolutionary War Case Study: Enoch Furr of Loudoun County Thursday, 7 November 2024, 10AM-12PM

Virtual Presentation - registration required

During and after the Revolutionary War, many records were created for soldiers. Most researchers are familiar with compiled military



service records (not all soldiers have them) and military pensions (not all soldiers have them). But there is more.

This lecture defines a reasonably exhaustive search for Revolutionary War soldier, Enoch Furr, a Loudoun County resident. Craig Roberts Scott, MA, CG, FUGA the President and CEO of Heritage Books, Inc. A professional genealogical and historical researcher for more than thirty years, he specializes in the records of the National Archives, especially those that relate to the military. Former IGHR, SLIG. and GRIP Military Course Coordinator.

Using Archival Collections in your Research

Laura Christiansen, Director of Thomas Balch Library, introduces techniques and tools for locating, understanding, and using archival materials in your research. This program will focus on finding and using letters, diaries, photographs, and other records as evidence in both historical and genealogical research. Examples from Thomas Balch Library's Rust Archives will be featured.

Huntland Sunday, 20 October 2024- 2-4PM

Huntland is a history of an historic estate in Middleburg, beginning in the 1830s, when master builder William Benton created the original house, and covering the state of the house and grounds—and its owners—into the third decade of the twenty-first century. It is a story full of intriguing and colorful characters,

beginning with the self-made, multitalented Benton and his children. The story focuses on the mercurial Gilded Age millionaire Joseph B. Thomas, who turned Huntland into one of the nation's premier foxhunting facilities in 1913; the Brown Brothers, George and Herman of Houston. who ran the giant construction company Brown & Root, and purchased Huntland in the 1950s: and the accomplished polymath Betsee Parker. restored the house, kennel, and stable its nineteen-teens to splendor, beginning in 2007 when she purchased the property.

Journalist and historian Marc Leepson is the author of ten books. His latest, Huntland: The Historic Virginia Country House, the Property, and Its Owners, 1741-2022, was published in December 2023.



A Path Through Willisville Sunday, 27 October 2024, 2-4PM

Carol Lee and Lori Kimball, authors of *A Path Through Willisville*, talk about the story of Willisville, VA.

A story of strength and perseverance, of a community working together to make a better place for all. It is about the people and the land.

In 2019, residents of the village and broader Willisville community came together to form the Willisville Preservation Foundation and nominate the village to the National Register of Historic Places. This book continues the Foundation's mission of honoring and preserving the community. The reader "walks" through the village, parcel by parcel, learning about the original property their immediate owners. descendants. and how the land evolved over time.

Dirt Don't Burn: A Black Community's Struggle for Educational Equality Under Segregation Sunday, 17 November 2024, 2-4PM

The system of educational apartheid that existed in the United States until the Brown v. Board of Education decision and its aftermath has affected every aspect of life for Black Americans.


Dirt Don't Burn by Larry Roeder and Barry Harrelson is the narrative of an extraordinary community that overcame cultural and legal hurdles of systematic racism. It describes how Loudoun County, Virginia, which once denied educational opportunity to Black Americans, gradually increased the equality of education for all children in the area. The book includes stories of largely unknown individuals and organizations that brought change to enduring habits of exclusion and prejudice toward African Americans. Dirt Don't Burn sheds new light on the history of segregation and inequity in American history. It provides new historical details and insights African into American experiences based original on research through thousands of records, archival NAACP files, and records educational of philanthropies.

Larry Roeder is the chief executive officer and chair of the board of the Edwin Washington Society. Barry Harrelson is an editor of the Bulletin of Loudoun County and the Edwin Washington Society.





DIRT DON'T BURN & OTHER BOOKS FOR SALE AT THE LIBRARY:


Looking for a way to support the library? Ask about our books for sale at the reference desk. Many are about local history written by local authors. Including *Dirt Don't Burn*!


There are limited copies and not all books will be restocked, so come while supplies last. Or enjoy reading the Library's copy in our comfortable Janney Room.
