

MANAGER'S MUSING



As year end approaches we often sit back and muse on the many and varied events of the passing year and pause to think where these experiences will take us in the future. Since the last Balch Column, many exciting programs and events have occurred at Thomas Balch Library just four among these are: a book signing, the 2004 Loudoun History Awards, presentation of a painting to the library and a two part workshop on the War of 1812. On November 9, Thomas Balch Library hosted a book signing by James A. Morgan, III, for his recently published volume, A Little Short of Boats: The Fights at Ball's Bluff and Edwards Ferry (2004). This year on November 14, four Loudoun County residents, Rachel Yarnell Thompson, Peggy Sands Drummond, Carol Morris Dukes and Marty Hiatt, were recognized for their

contributions to the preservation and dissemination of Loudoun County history. On December 4, Katherine Summers, a local artist, teacher, musician and member of the Black History Committee of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, Inc., presented a painting entitled "The Legacy: The Virginians...'This Far by Faith'" to Thomas Balch Library in thanks and recognition for the important work librarians do for the community. The oil and acrylic painting, filled with bright colours and images, is on display in the Howard Clark Room of Thomas Balch Library. On December 18, we were privileged to host a two part program on James Monroe and the War of 1812. James P. Lucier, Sr., spoke on James Monroe's involvement in the war nobody really wanted and Craig Scott talked about the process of researching soldiers who fought in the War of 1812. A copy of Mr. Lucier's presentation is available for perusal at the Library. If you missed these outstanding programs be sure to check our spring offerings. From book signings to a presentation on prominent women and genealogical workshops there is a class or an event to interest anyone.

Among our many activities is the collection and preservation of printed, manuscript, photographic and genealogical documentation of Leesburg, Loudoun County and surrounding region. We actively seek and welcome donations of original business records, diaries, correspondence and photographs (with identification) to document the life, culture, and history of Leesburg and Loudoun County. These materials are carefully processed, described, catalogued in the National Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections (accessible through Library of Congress website) and made available for research use. Photographic images are scanned and indexed. We also purchase, and accept by donation, published works that include information about Leesburg, Loudoun County, Civil War, War of 1812, Revolutionary War, and local and regional history and genealogy. The strength of our collections reflects the generosity of our many donors.

Thanks to all who have made this a successful year – our friends, patrons, donors, Library Advisory Commissioners, and Friends of Thomas Balch Library, Inc.

INTERMEDIATE GENEALOGY


Jinx Hartung Saturday, May 14, 2005 ■ 10-12 noon


