

POLITICS AND CULTURE IN THE TWENTIETH CENTURY SOUTH: RACE, REASON, AND MASSIVE RESISTANCE James R Sweeney

Sunday, 24 February 2008, 2PM



James R. Sweeney will discuss his recent book Race, Reason, and Massive Resistance: The Diary of David J Mays, 1954-1959. David J. Mays, of Richmond, Virginia, was a highly regarded attorney, a Pulitzer Prize-winning biographer, and a member of his city's political and social elite. He was also a diarist for most of his adult life and his private writings offer insight into his state's embrace of massive white resistance following the 1954 Brown v. Board of Education ruling. This volume comprises excerpts from his diaries from 1954 to 1959. During this time Mays was counsel to a commission, chaired by state senator Garland Gray, charged with formulating Virginia's response to federal mandates concerning integration of public schools. Mays chronicled the state's bitter and divisive shift away from the Gray Commission's proposal that school integration questions be settled at the local level. Instead, Virginia's

arch-segregationists, led by US Senator Harry F. Byrd, championed a monolithic defiance of integration at the highest state and federal levels. Many leading Virginians of the time appear in Mays' diary, along with details of their roles in the battle against desegregation as it was fought in the media, courts, polls, and government back rooms. Mays' own racial attitudes were hardly progressive; yet his temperament and legal training put a relatively moderate public face on them. As Sweeney notes, Mays differences with extremists were about means more than ends—about "not the morality of Jim Crow but the best tactics for defending it."

James R. Sweeney, Associate Professor of History, Old Dominion University, specializes in Virginia history and recent American political history. He received his BA from Providence College and his MA and PhD from Notre Dame. His publications include *Old Dominion University: A Half Century of Service;* "The Trials of Shelby County, Tennessee: 'Judge Lynch' Presiding," *Tennessee Historical Quarterly;* "A Segregationist on the Civil Rights Commission: John S. Battle, 1957-1959," *The Virginia Magazine of History and Biography,* and Harry Byrd: Vanished Polices and Enduring Principles," *The Virginia Quarterly Review.*

THERE AND BACK AGAIN: NAZI ANTHROPOLOGICAL DATA AT THE SMITHSONIAN

Lech Kaczynsk, President of Poland, formally accepted transfer from the Smithsonian Institution the Institut für Deutsche Ostarbeit papers during a ceremony at the Polish Consulate, New York City, 26 September 2007. The transfer marked the end of the collection's sixty-plus year odyssey from Krakow to Germany to the United States and back to Poland. The collection consists primarily of anthropological research data from the Institute for German Eastern Research -- Section for Race and National Traditions Research (Institut für Deutsche Ostarbeit – Sektion für Rassen- und Volkstumforschung) gathered from Poles in Nazi-occupied Poland by anthropologists employed by the Nazi government. The nature of this collection makes it an invaluable resource for genealogists, historians, and scholars of many specialties. Panelists will discuss the story of the documents, how they ended up in Poland, and explore types of data found in the collection.

Ruth Selig is Special Assistant to Cristián Samper, Acting Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution. Her educational background includes degrees from Wellesley College, Harvard University, and George Washington University. Selig taught anthropology and history at the college and high school levels before joining the Smithsonian to develop anthropology teacher training programs. She continues to co-edit *AnthroNotes*, a Smithsonian Department of Anthropology publication for teachers which she founded almost thirty years ago. A compendium of the best articles from this publication became the award-winning book, *Anthropology Explored: The Best of Smithsonian AnthroNotes* published by Smithsonian Books.

Edie Hedlin served as Director of the Smithsonian Institution Archives from 1994 until her retirement in 2005. She held positions with NARA and NHPRC, served as consultant to major organizations, was the first Corporate Archivist for Wells Fargo Bank and began her career at Ohio Historical Society. Hedlin has an MA and PhD in history from Duke University. She is a past president of the Society of American Archivists and a founding member of the Academy of Certified Archivists.

Beth Schuster, Library Reference Specialist, Thomas Balch Library, holds a BA in History and German from University of Oregon, an MA in History with an emphasis in Central European History from University of Maryland, and an MLS, with a special-

ization in archives and concentration in academic libraries from University of Maryland. Schuster was archivist for the IDO-SRV project and has worked for the Collection Management Division of University of Maryland Libraries, University of Maryland Archives, and volunteered in the US Holocaust Memorial Museum archives.

FROM THE DIRECTORS DESK



Thomas Balch Library hosted the fifteenth annual Loudoun History Awards sponsored by Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission on Sunday, 11 November 2007. Two Loudoun County residents and one group received awards. This year's honorees were the Laurel Brigade restoration and preservation group: Joe Ritenour, Dan Travostino, Christine Mougin-Boal, Stilson Greene and Rhonda Paice, for their role in restoring and preserving an historic landmark in Loudoun County, Lou Etta Watkins, for her longstanding commitment to Loudoun County heritage and its African American history, and Cate Magennis Wyatt, for her deep appreciation for the region's history and for her work in preserving it. In recognition of the Loudoun History Awards an exhibit, curated by Stephanie Adams

Hunter, Library Archives Specialist, was installed at Thomas Balch Library. It highlighted four past Loudoun History Award winners: Vinton Liddell Pickens, 1993, for her paintings of historic houses; Elaine E. Thompson, 1998, for her work in preserving and promoting Loudoun County's African American history; Patricia B. Duncan, 2005, for her efforts to increase access to Loudoun County's records through abstracting and indexing and The Honorable Thomas D. Horne, 2005, for his work uncovering and preserving the history of the courthouse square. We were pleased to be able to include artifacts from the courthouse lawn excavation on loan from The Honorable Thomas D. Horne.

Two additional exhibits curated by staff were on display this fall. One in honor of Native American Heritage Month which provided an introduction to Loudoun County and Virginia Native American heritage through a series of frequently asked questions. The exhibit featured a variety of artifacts, including arrowheads, celts, axe heads, and an atlatl stone, from the collection of Loudoun County resident Doug Allshouse and was curated by Beth Schuster, Library Reference Specialist. The other exhibit, curated by Mary Fishback, Library Assistant, was Leesburg Virginia Memorabilia 1900 to 1975. It included photographs and artifacts from downtown Leesburg's business district including Coca-Cola bottles filled in Leesburg, bottles from Purcell and Littlejohn Pharmacy, a replica of the Mighty Midget Kitchen, and 1950's play bills from the Tally-Ho Theatre.

The Lower Norfolk Antiquary was recently acquired closing a critical gap in our collection holdings. It is also a pleasure to announce Footnote.com is available for research use in the library. Footnote in partnership with The National Archives, Family Search and Allen County Library provides access to original documentation of interest to historical and genealogical researchers.

As manuscript collections are processed guides are posted to the library web pages. These may be found at http://www.leesburgva.com/services/library/. In a major step forward in managing our collections we have acquired Past Perfect software and Beth Schuster has begun entering data. As access to manuscript and book collections is currently available through alternate sources, i.e. NUCMC and HORIZON, our focus, initially, will be in entering data related to visual collections.

In response to a recent increase in inquiries for internships, guidelines and information about the application process have been formalized and posted to the town web site http://www.leesburgva.com/services/library/interns/. Revised guidelines and new application forms for library volunteers will be posted online in the near future. It is a pleasure to share with you an outstanding achievement of one of our volunteers. Emily Hershman, a student at Loudoun County High School who has been processing collections for us, was honored 11 November 2007 at the Loudoun County Public School's Excellence in Education banquet which recognized students for maintaining a 4.0 or better during their high school years.

As always it will be my pleasure to see you when visiting Thomas Balch Library or when attending our programs.

presentation will place


the Carter family of Oatlands in the social and business milieu of 19th century Loudoun, from the time Carter took possession of the Goose Creek Tract in 1798 through the Reconstruction era as experienced by his wife, sons, and daughters-in-law. Elizabeth Simon is curator of interpretation and collections at Oatlands Historic House & Gardens, a site of the National Trust for Historic Preservation near Leesburg, VA. She holds an MA from the College of William & Mary and has spent much of her working life as a writer and editor for scholarly, university press, and association publishers.
